Did you know that there aren't any AMBER lantern globes in rail-roading? Len Beard informs us that while visiting a tower on the C. & N.W. Ry. he was told that all lenses in switch lamps, globes etc. are yellow not amber. Amber is more toward orange in color. Yellow is used on any road using caution aspects on their signals. So when referring to caution aspects of signals, they should be called by their proper color YELLOW not amber.

How about a discussion on how one counts lanterns as to some railroads? For example, The NEW YORK CENTRAL you may have N.Y.C.L. or N.Y.C.S. or N.Y.C.RR or just NEW YORK CENTRAL marked on a lantern Would you count this as one railroad or four roads? I myself would call them as being different lanterns. We run into this on a lot of railroads, M.K.& T. and MKT, two or one? These lanterns come from the same railroad but different corporate identies. Art Pickles came up with these questions and we should hear from you fellows (and gals).

I know myself, being up near Buffalo and N.Y.C. territory I'll bet I could fill a good size room with Central lanterns and not have one the same. By the time you collect  $3\frac{1}{4}$  globe size  $4\frac{1}{4}$ , 5 3/8 5 7/8 plus the different manufactures etc. etc. you got yourself a collection just with the NEW YORK CENTRAL.

Hear is an old one for you, O.C. & N.R. OLD COLONY & NEWPORT RAILROAD Pat. date 1854 Art Pickles ownes this one and he says it has an 82" globe with one inch letters cut into the globe. It was manufactured by N.E. Glass Co.

Hugh T. Guillaume, 1629 W. 13 Wichita, Kansas 67203 would like to know what manufacture made the following two lanterns, L.S. & M.S., bell bottom dated 13 January 1874 and a C.M.& St.P.Ry. bell bottom, dated 28 May 1895.

In trying to make the more rusted lanterns more presentable, says Robert H. Read, we use a grapite based gove polist, and rub them down well. It is a quick, short-cut method, but it does look better than rust and leaves a metallic finish.

New York, New York" bell bottom, solid brass lantern. --- Len Beard has a switch key from the North West Elevated Railroad N.W.E.R.R. and aE.J.& S. East Jordan & Southern key. --- Art Pickles has a D.S.& S.R.R. Delaware Susquehanna & Schuylkill R.R. 1889 --- Bob & Lou Jones have a N.& W.R.R. with the road cut in glass but the lantern has no protective wires. ---- Don L. Taler tells us he has a Pullman lantern that is silverplated with wire frame and bell bottom which has Pullman stamped on the base and P. Company embossed on the globe. Another rare lantern comes from Robert H. Read it is a G.V.G.& N.RR Gila Valley Globe & Northern.







In looking over the Adlake World (news letter) I see that they are installing Adlake aluminum windows in those high-speed trains that will be running between Montreal and Toronto. These are Turbine-powered high speed aluminum trains scheduled for service on the Canadian National.




With the coming of electricity into the field of transportation one of the places it was used was on street cars where it replaced horses. It, also, was used for lighting in place of oil lamps so a line of electric fixtures was developed and sold for use in the new cars. Electric headlights for these cars were also put on the market, as well as carbon pencil are lamps for outdoor or indoor illumination.





So as to broaden its line and get into another field of transportation the plant and good-will of The Stewart-Mattson Company, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was purchased in 1898. This company was making hardware for ships and gave to The Adams & Westlake Company a new outlet for its products, particularly, on the east coast where the bulk of shipbuilding was being carried on.

Prior to 1899 The Adams & Westlake Company had manufactured a line of window shades for use on railway and electric cars but in that year joined with Forsyth Brothers Co. in forming The Curtain Supply Company and turned over its window shade and fixture business to the new company.

# ADLAKE Model 48 Switch Lock

The ADLAKE model 48 switch lock as shown in this bulletin is the result of nearly a century of serving the railroads of the United States. Out of this experience and the problems of these years the enswer has been found in the details of design and construction as the rich this lock. In other words, through these years the rich problems that have arisen in actual service have been faced and overcome until today this lock is now acknowledged to be the cutstanding switch lock in the railroad field. This accounts for the fact that so many roads have adopted it as their standard.

This No. 48 switch lock is made of heavy sheet steel and the strong shackle is of malleable iron. These parts are given a heavy coating of cadmium against corrosion. The shackle is riveted and hinged to the case with a heavy pin so as to avoid any chance of coming loose and allowing the switch to be operated by unauthorized persons.

The tumblers and other working parts inside the case are made of manganese bronze and are of a strong, sturdy design so as to assure the lock always being in a workable condition and to give it long life under hard operating demands. The design of these working parts are such that they double lock the shackle at both front and back, thus making it proof against being "picked" and also prevents the lock being jarred open by sharp blows. As a realt, it is impossible to open this lock without the proper key.


The springs are of selected steel, so as to avoid their taking a "set", and to assure a positive operation of the lock. They, also, are treated to resist corrosion.

A ten (10) inch length of heavy chain is furnished as standard with the model 48 lock but longer lengths can be supplied when desired.

These locks can be fittled to any standard type switch key. While it is not necessary to purchase keys with the locks such keys can be furnished. They are made by expert key-makers of long experience.

To assure yourself of absolutely dependable switch locks be sure to specify and order the ADLAKE model 48.

There may be locations or conditions under which it is desirable to have the switch lock made of brass. To meet these conditions



the lock as described above can be furnished with the case and shackle made of brass but with the same protective design and construction as with the steel lock.

For overall dimensions of the model 48 lock see sketch on page 4 of this bulletin.
