In reply to Fred Schmidt with the unusual Adlake lamp: David Peters of Wallingford, Conn. sent in a reply. He states it is from Penn Central and before that the NYC. They were used as rear markers on their private cars. Thanks Dave.

Fred Schmidt's unusual lantern, page 129, turns out to be an Adlake #1403 caboose marker lamp. Info comes from W. A. Rusk of Adams & Westlake. Nice to get it from the horse's mouth, isn't it, Fred?

Walter received a letter from Dale George of Canon City, Colo. It seems Dale is a real bug on this key and lock business, also a new subscriber. To quote a portion of the letter: "I now have more than 1,000 completely different RR locks dating back to over 135 years. Some of them weigh more than 4½ lbs. each, and are made of bronze, brass, solid nickel, copper and one of 24 karat gold." The later lock was awarded to Dale's grandfather, who was the first engineer through the Alpine Tunnel on the Denver, South Park & Pacific. 












Double Guard Wire Lanterns


Wire Guard Lanterns


