Uncertain Times for Everyone

I've had this issue of the *KL&L News* almost ready to go out for a couple of weeks now, but I've been holding off on finishing it in the hope that something might become more clear regarding the COVID-19 virus situation. The months of April and May are usually filled with railroad shows and historical society conventions, but one by one they have been cancelled due to the spread of the virus.

The Key Lock & Lantern Convention is scheduled for the weekend of June 5-7, which is still two months away. Since so much can change from week to week, we are holding off on making the decision to cancel or postpone it. The KL&L convention committee has been meeting by video conference on a regular basis, and we will evaluate the situation during the first week of May and make a plan at that point.

We have an excellent new facility for the convention this year - the Hotel Anthracite in Carbondale, PA - with a large banquet room that will accommodate more exhibitors and our evening dinner program. Our Sunday train ride on the historic Stourbridge Line will feature some unique rolling stock and spectacular scenery, along with lunch on board the train. We were certainly on track to having one of the best conventions ever, and we will adapt our plan as needed.

I still remember the first KL&L Convention that I attended from start to finish. I had previously only stopped in for an anonymous short visit to a couple of shows at the invitation of Randy Bushart (back when it was an almost "secret" event for members only). This time, registering for the weekend, I attended the Friday room hopping, the show, auction, and Saturday dinner. In that one weekend, I gained more knowledge about railroadiana than I had previously learned over many years of collecting. I also saw rare memorabilia that I hadn't even known existed and met retired railroaders who shared stories of their days on the high iron.

I discovered that the "secret society" atmosphere of KL&L was left over from the highly competitive collecting market of the 70's and 80's and was not indicative of the personality of the members. Everyone was welcoming and excited about sharing their knowledge. A year or two later, John & Marie Brainard took over as convention organizers and gradually opened it up to all historians and collectors.

Today, we have an event which is open to all, includes every type of railroad, transportation, and related memorabilia (old timers will remember when it was a "railroad hardware only" show), and has additional activities such as programs and train rides. The heart of the convention remains unchanged, though, with exhibitors still arranging excellent displays, doing some wheeling and dealing, and just hanging out shooting the bull late into the evening.

I hope that you can join us for this year's convention, whether it remains on schedule or takes place at a later date. In the meantime, stay safe and healthy, and good luck with hunting for railroadiana online.

KL&L Returns to Anthracite Region for 2020 Convention

Key Lock & Lantern will return to the Scranton, PA region for its 48th Annual Convention, planned for the weekend of June 5-7, 2020. This year's convention headquarters will be the Hotel Anthracite in downtown Carbondale, PA, located about 20 miles north of our previous hotel in Scranton. A variety of activities are planned, including lectures, dinner, and an excursion on the nearby Stourbridge Line railroad.

The main event of the convention will be the Transportation History Exposition, to be held in the hotel banquet hall on Saturday, June 6th. KL&L members will present exhibits on transportation and industrial history, and will offer original memorabilia for sale or trade. From lanterns and dining car china to books and timetables, there will be something of interest to every collector.

Unlike most hobby shows, this event is just as much about sharing information and creating interesting displays as it is about selling artifacts. Subjects of recent exhibits have included lanterns from railroads of western New York,

memorabilia from the Chicago & Alton Railroad, the Taylor Manufacturing Company, the Lackawanna Railroad, locks & lanterns from Anthracite railroads, employee timetables of the 19th century, and similar themes.

The annual meeting of Key Lock & Lantern will take place during the show, along with the organization's fund raiser sale. In this light-hearted event, donated railroadiana is sold to the highest bidder, with all proceeds going to support

the activities of KL&L. From "fixer upper" lanterns and common timetables for the budget minded to some higher quality pieces, we never know what will turn up. There are always some good deals to be found!

On Saturday evening, a buffet dinner will be served in the hotel banquet room, followed by history presentations by the members of KL&L. Past programs have included slide shows by New England photographer Tom Carver, the Erie

COVID-19 Situation Update

With the uncertainty surrounding the current situation with the COVID-19 virus, the KL&L Convention Committee is meeting regularly via video conference to discuss possible changes to the schedule. If there are still widespread cases of the virus and/or travel restrictions remain in place for the month of June (which is looking likely), the convention will be rescheduled. Registrants will be able to receive a full refund if unable to attend on the new dates or if unable to attend on the original date if it remains on schedule. We will provide an update in the next KL&L News, on Facebook, and on the Key Lock & Lantern website during the first week of May.

Local railroad researcher Joey Senese presented the results of his study of the Port Jervis & Monticello RR and author John Taibi gave a preview of the material in his recently released book about

the New York Central Adirondack Division. In addition to the more formal presentations, KL&L members always bring a grab bag of slides and digital material. This year's program will be announced soon.

On Sunday, activities move up the road to Honesdale, the small town where boats on the Delaware & Hudson Canal received coal from the connecting gravity railroad. It was on this line that the Stourbridge Lion, one of the first steam locomotives in the country, was tested. The Erie Railroad also constructed a branch here from its mainline in Lackawaxen, which was later extended all the way to the Scranton area. Today, the Stourbridge Line operates tourist trains over this route, and a KL&L convention lunch will take place onboard the train.

Departing from Honesdale station at noon, box lunches will be served in the restored dining car, while the train makes its way along the Erie branch toward Lackawaxen. Riders will

enjoy views of the river and mountain scenery, along with traces of the original D&H Canal. A first class operation, the Stourbridge Line rosters a variety of meticulously restored rolling stock.

Those who have attended previous conventions already know that the Scranton area is full of museums and historic sites related to railroad and industrial history. The Hotel Anthracite has extended its special KL&L rate to include Thursday and Sunday nights, for those who wish to spend some extra time in the area. Steamtown, the Electric City Trolley Museum, and Wayne County Historical Society all contain excellent exhibits of memorabilia, and are worth visiting. There should also be plenty of Alco-powered train action on the Delaware-Lackawanna Railroad, which has seen steady growth in traffic and runs several trains each day.

Be sure to register early - space is limited!

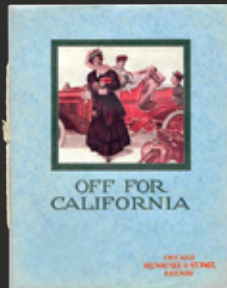

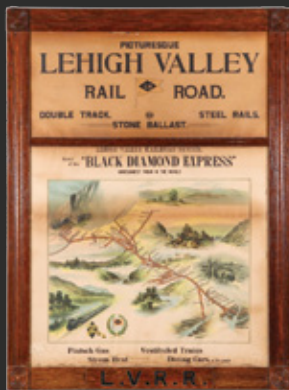

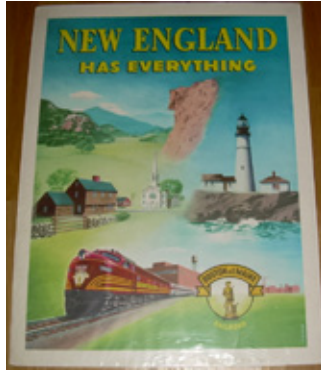

East Broad Top Railroad to Resume Operations Under New Ownership

Pennsylvania's storied East Broad Top Railroad has a new owner, a nonprofit foundation organized by a small group of prominent rail-industry figures and longtime EBT fans. The new organization will offer several EBT events in 2020, the 60th anniversary of the start of tourist service on the railroad, and hopes to resume regular operation in 2021.

The organization, called the EBT Foundation Inc., will own approximately 27 miles of the line, from the south end of the concrete-arch bridge over the Aughwick River below Mount Union to the road crossing in Wood Township. The foundation will also own the narrow-gauge railroad's shops, rolling stock, and equipment. The East Broad Top is a National Historic Landmark and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

"This is the best possible outcome for the railroad, which has been in my family for two generations," says Joseph Kovalchick, whose father, Nick Kovalchick, purchased the East Broad Top Railroad & Coal Company after its coal mines closed in 1956. "It is with a combination of pride and relief that we pass the torch in its second reincarnation." The Kovalchicks will continue to own coal-company property that had been jointly owned with the railroad.

"When my father bought the company, it was never his intention to scrap the railroad. At the time he was the only one to stand for the EBT, and his role in the history books is assured. My generation has struggled to balance the need to preserve this national treasure with running it as a business, and I take pride in our role in its survival. But it is clear that a for-profit business model is not sustainable. Our faith in the new model is reflected in both the sale and the Kovalchick family's ongoing role on the board of the new non-profit."

Brad Esposito, a 20-year veteran of the Buffalo & Pittsburgh Railroad, a Genesee & Wyoming, Inc. company, led the effort to purchase the EBT, along with longtime EBT enthusiasts David Brightbill, Lawrence Biemiller, and Stephen Lane.



Backers of the new organization include three rail-industry and rail-preservation heavyweights: Wick Moorman, former chairman and CEO of Norfolk Southern and former CEO of Amtrak; Henry Posner III, a former Conrail manager who is chairman of the Iowa Interstate Railroad and the Railroad Development Corporation, of Pittsburgh; and Bennett Levin, a retired mechanical and electrical engineer who owns the Juniata Terminal Company, which operates two Pennsylvania Railroad E8 diesel locomotives and three private cars.

Esposito will become the general manager of the railroad. He says the EBT Foundation has a three-part mission. It's committed, first, to preserving and operating the East Broad Top as a steam railroad; second, to educating visitors about the role of railroads in local and national history; and, third, to promoting regional tourism and economic growth.

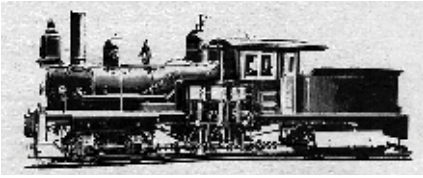
Esposito says the new organization will immediately begin work on several fronts. The EBT has been closed since late 2011, and before operations can resume, the railroad will need to overhaul track and equipment, including locomotives and passenger cars. A fire-suppression system will be installed in the historic machine shops and roundhouse, and several structural stabilization projects will be undertaken in the railroad's Rockhill Furnace complex.

"The East Broad Top is a unique national treasure unmatched anywhere in the United States," says Esposito. "It has been impressively preserved for over 60 years by the Kovalchick family. We are excited to pick up the torch and ensure that the railroad is preserved for future generations."

"Our close partners will be the volunteers of the Friends of the East Broad Top," he says. "They have contributed countless hours of work and significant amounts of money to help preserve the historic fabric of the EBT since 1983."

“Also, we look forward to working with the Rockhill Trolley Museum,” says Esposito. The all-volunteer trolley museum dates to 1960 and operates over the former Shade Gap Branch of the EBT. “This will be an exciting opportunity to promote and further develop tourism in the area.”

“The East Broad Top is a remarkable survivor from the age of steam railroading,” says Moorman. “I’m delighted to have the chance to be a part of its revival, both for the preservation of such an important part of our industrial heritage, and for the economic benefits that it will provide to an area of Pennsylvania that is so closely linked to the railroad industry.”

Levin notes that the EBT runs through a bucolic landscape almost unchanged since the early 1900s. “The railroad’s historic fabric is an important component of the region’s industrial archaeology, and the educational possibilities here are almost limitless.”

The new organization’s advisors include Linn Moedinger, former president of the Strasburg Rail Road — one of the most successful tourist railroads in the U.S. — and Rod Case, a partner at the consulting firm Oliver Wyman who leads their railway practice. Among the organizations providing support is the Allegheny Ridge Corporation, which manages the region’s state-designated Heritage Area. The corporation “is thrilled to participate in the rebirth of this great asset,” says Astride McLanahan, a longtime board member of the organization. “The EBT is a jewel in the Allegheny Ridge Heritage Area and its revitalization will bring economic opportunity to this rural community.”

Built from 1872 to 1874 to haul coal to a new iron furnace in the center of the state, the 33-mile-long East Broad Top survived the collapse of the local iron industry at the turn of the 20th century because the top-quality coal it carried had found other markets, thanks in part to close cooperation with the Pennsylvania Railroad. When the last of the coal mines closed in 1956, the East Broad Top was purchased by the Kovalchick Salvage Company of Indiana, Pa. Despite being in the scrap business, the company left the railroad intact and in 1960 reopened a portion of the line for steam-powered tourist trains that proved widely popular.

With rails just three feet apart — 4’ 8 ½” is the industry standard — the EBT is the only original narrow-gauge railroad surviving east of the Rocky Mountains, and it is well known as one of the world’s finest preserved railways. The railroad’s shops complex, which dates to the 1880s and was greatly expanded from 1905 to 1907, is among the most complete early-20th-century industrial facilities anywhere in the U.S.

Still in the railroad’s roundhouse in Rockhill Furnace are six narrow-gauge steam locomotives built for the EBT by Philadelphia’s Baldwin Locomotive Works between 1911 and 1920. They share the building with the unique M-1 gas-electric, constructed at the railroad in 1927 with plans and parts from Philadelphia’s J.G. Brill Company, a leading



streetcar manufacturer, and Westinghouse Electric. Other EBT equipment includes several passenger cars believed to date to the 1890s and numerous steel freight cars built in the EBT shops. The East Broad Top was the only American narrow gauge to convert to an all-steel freight car fleet.

Remarkably, track remains in place over nearly the entire 33-mile main line, which connected the coal mines in Robertsdale to the Pennsylvania Railroad’s Great Broad Way in Mount Union. The former PRR main line is now Norfolk Southern’s core east-west route between Harrisburg and Pittsburgh.

“The East Broad Top Railroad is a unique historic asset that is a national treasure representing our area’s rich railroad heritage,” says Sen. Judy Ward, who represents southern Huntingdon County in the Pennsylvania Senate. “The sale of this railroad to this group of longtime EBT enthusiasts who are committed to preserving and operating it as a steam railroad is very exciting news for the region because it preserves this irreplaceable treasure for future generations while opening up significant tourism and economic development opportunities.”

Says Posner: “August 13, 2020, will be the 60th anniversary of the East Broad Top’s first reopening, which took place during the bicentennial of the founding of what became the ‘twin boroughs’ of Orbisonia and Rockhill Furnace. This was an era of revised expectations in the face of the decline of the railroad industry nationwide. At that time Nick Kovalchick could not have imagined the possibility of reopening the entire line, but fortunately our industry’s renaissance has helped create an environment in which this important and audacious project can succeed. We are honored to follow in the footsteps of two generations of the family that has made this all possible.”

“This will be a monumental undertaking,” says Esposito, “and I encourage anyone interested in helping us to join the Friends of the East Broad Top and come work on buildings, track and equipment.” (*News courtesy of the EBT Foundation and photos from the collection of the Library of Congress*)

Amherst Railway Society's Railroad Hobby Show Draws Large Crowds to Springfield

With hundreds of vendors and exhibitors involved with all aspects of railroads and modeling, the Amherst Railway Society's show is probably the biggest annual event in the hobby. Held over the last weekend in January at the Eastern States Exposition fairgrounds in West Springfield, MA, it brings representatives of national model manufacturers, historical societies, book publishers, and modular model groups.

This year's event drew a crowd of over 21,500 attendees, with layouts, displays, and sales tables filling five different buildings. It is almost impossible to see everything in one day, and many attendees stay overnight and spend the entire weekend at the show. While railroadiana makes up only a small part of the material for sale (there is an just as much packed into one room at the KL&L Convention), there is usually something of interest to collectors. Several KL&L members regularly have tables at the show, which is a good way to reach general hobbyists and more casual collectors.

Most railroadiana dealers reported fairly good sales, which offset the relatively high cost of selling at the show (tables are \$150 each), and were pleased with the attendance. While most visitors come for the model train layouts, hopefully a few younger ones were bitten by the memorabilia bug. Either way, at the end of the day there were plenty of people with smiles on their faces trudging wearily through the muddy parking field.

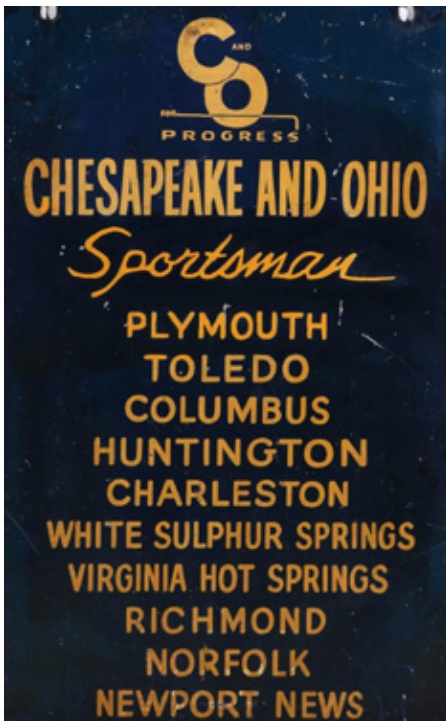

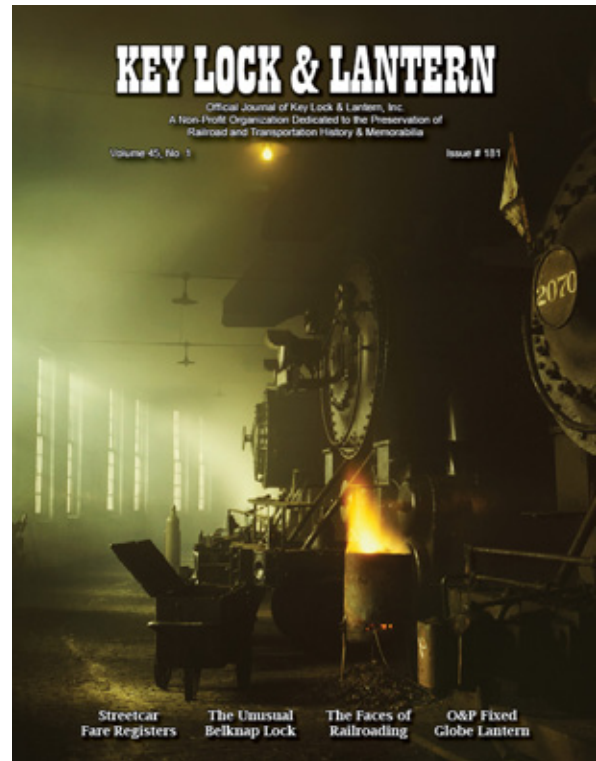

The PEREC globe geometry is different from O&P but lettering is similar with "PEREC" embossed on the front panel, and "RR Co." embossed in the rear. I must say that I was tempted with the non-standard size lantern configuration, as I found several sets that fit the globe nicely, but those style lanterns tend to be from the New England area and thus geographically incorrect for the O&P.

After more than three years of research, working my network, and hard searching, in April, 2017, action taken in central Ohio contained fixed globe lanterns with a lantern globe which appeared from photos that it might be correct. I attended the auction and bought the three shown below with high hopes that O&P would fit. Fortunately, the unmarked globe was already broken because it would have been very difficult to extract from the frame, intact.

This frame has a non-Atasco/typical Western look, and fixed globe lanterns made for railroad use from these regions tend to be of similar configuration, with keyhole figures in the chimney and round or matching shell figures in the base cylinders.

I proceeded to disassemble the frame, and decided to leave the cage intact because the unmarked cage size frame length was very close to the same comparing the original globe installation. I identified a "typical" replacement was best for the unit, leaving "good" parts intact, so I decided to work the frame components in TSP and used a stainless steel toothbrush to remove all loose rust, loose dirt, and other contaminants from the steel component. The end result was a nice, tight, undisturbed, clean part.

With the frame component clean, some minor frame straightening, and re-assembly of a few cage parts, the lantern was made ready for assembly. Tom's Planter of Paris was used to connect the top and base components to the frame, after which the top and bottom flanges were soldered in their respective cage wires. Fortunately, there was no modification required to cage wire length. Originally, I was expecting that some cage wires would have to be fabricated due to possible globe length difference.

The lantern was finished with an application of Clarendon and the final result is shown above and on the back cover. It was added among my growing collection of early western Pennsylvania fixed globe lanterns. Editor's note: Callipers are no longer available with Andy's excellent restoration work on the lanterns that he has displayed at EL&L conventions.
